Joseph Bologne, "Le Chevalier de Saint-Georges", was born on the Caribbean island of Guadeloupe on December 25, 1745. His mother, an enslaved black girl called "La Belle Nanon" was sixteen years old at the time of her son's birth. Joseph's father was George Bologne, a wealthy, white plantation owner. George Bologne was married to Elisabeth Mérican, with whom he had a daughter, Elisabeth, Joseph's half-sister.

Joseph was educated in France and became a renowned swordsman violinist, composer, and conductor.

At the age of seventeen, Joseph Bologne was made an officer of the king's guard (Louis XVI) and became "Le Chevalier de Saint-Georges". In 1792, he commanded the *Légion des Américains et du Midi*, a cavalry unit for "citizens of color", but due to the Reign of Terror of the following year, he was imprisoned for eighteen months.

In a necrology (or obituary) for Bologne, written in 1799 by J.S. A. Cuvelier, this contemporary of Bologne's expressed the following: "The entire world knows St. George's superiority in the art of fencing. He was no less superior in the dance, equitation, music, and without exception in all the physical exercises."
